## **Latino Unemployment on the Rise**

U.S. Job Growth Slows: Employers Add 160,000 Jobs in April



## **Business Services Industry Leads Growth**

Professional and business services lead growth among all industries by adding 65,000 jobs in April. Within the management, administrative, and waste services subset of this category, Latinos are heavily represented among landscaping services (44%) and services to buildings and dwellings (42%).

## The Employment Situation for Latino Workers in April 2016

The U.S. Department of Labor reported today that U.S. employers added 160,000 jobs in April 2016, down from 215,000 in March and even further from February 2016's high point of 245,000. Modest job growth helped keep the national unemployment rate at 5%. The Latino unemployment rate, however, rose from 5.6% in March to 6.1% in April. This marks the highest Latino unemployment rate so far this year, but is still significantly less than it was in April 2015 when it stood at nearly 7%. There was no change in the number of Latino part-time workers who would prefer full-time work in April, keeping this sizable group at six million since November 2015.
